Home Learning, Summer Term starting April 20th, 2020

The home learning packs and website links have proven to be very popular but as we head towards the summer term not knowing when we will be back in school, here at Hogarth we have been planning learning for each year group so that children can complete the work online, the teacher can see the work online and feedback to them in a safe way.

To do this we will be using the web-based platform J2E for children in reception upwards, ask your child, they know how to access, if they have forgotten – see below!
Nursery children will be working slightly differently.

As of Monday April 20th, your child will need to log in online to J2E, we use this in school, the children will know it and below are some prompts on how to get online to get learning.

Each class teacher will post an eBook for the children to read and some reading comprehension questions based around the text followed by some learning in other subjects based on the book. The children can answer directly online or upload their work. Each teacher will then be able to see what your child has done online and provide some feedback about it. There will be new work on J2E every Monday for the week, until we know when we are returning to school.

Nursery children do not have access to J2E so Miss Ward will be posting work up onto the website every Monday into the nursery file and there will be an email address on the document you can return photos of your child's learning to so that Miss Ward can reply to you.

How does my child log on to J2E?

Here are different usernames for some of the classes. These are as follows:

F2 - first name and the initial of their surname, e.g. calums

Y1 - first name only, e.g. calum

Y2 - first name and the initial of their surname, e.g. calums

KS2 should all know how to log on as they have used it regularly.

Free School Meals

If you received the Wonde Vouchers last week, you will be receiving a voucher from the new government scheme after the Easter holidays. We have no further information on this at the moment but understand they should be available week beginning 20th April, we will of course keep you updated on this, as soon as we know, you will !

These are for children whose parents are in receipt of the following benefits and are logged with Nottingham City :

- Is aged 16 or under
- Attends a Nottingham city school

If you, the parent or carer, receive at least one of the following benefits:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseekers Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- the guarantee element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit, but NOT entitled to Working Tax Credit and you have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190, as assessed by Her Majesty's Revenue and Customs¹
- Support under of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999 section 95
- Universal Credit (income thresholds apply)

Where a parent is entitled to Working Tax Credit Run-on - the payment someone receives for a further four weeks after they stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit - their children are entitled to free school lunches. Children who receive a qualifying benefit are also eligible to receive free school meals.
